In March 2023, eight people from WCC (Louis Robards, George Robards, Spencer Holmes, Ann Stewart, Marshall Trees, Mary Jane Hochstein, and Tad and Lorie Dyrdahl) joined me and Lisette Chapman as we travelled to Bijagua, Costa Rica with Bricks to Bread, a nonprofit organization and Dough Grant recipient that helps build brick ovens for Costa Rican families seeking a sustainable source of income. Brick ovens not only help provide a family with an income, but they also bring communities together. The ovens are often a focal point in these towns, becoming a gathering place for community events, and encouraging camaraderie by welcoming all to participate in the build. Through donations, collaboration, and volunteerism, Bricks to Bread helps provide a sustainable source of income for a deserving family in need by educating and assisting them in the construction, maintenance and expansion of an outdoor brick oven used to make and sell fresh baked goods to their community.


Reflection from Ann Johnson

love how Bricks to Bread is filling a need with a well-developed and practical solution. I like to think of this kind of mission as "pulling up" not "lifting up". What I mean by that is this: many people needing to improve their lives need just one thing to make it happen.

That may be time, money, information, etc. We think about lifting or pushing people up from below, but what so many really need is a pull from people who have those things. It's easier to pull than to lift. So, Bricks to Bread doesn't just fund classes or supplies — they take action to remove a huge barrier (getting an oven built), and in the process draw in others to both do the actual work and provide the funds. I love that the work feeds the volunteers, the staff, the families and women who get the help. And I love that we do the work in their homes, so we can see how they live and meet them as humans.

The Costa Rican country is glorious. We stayed on a farm that was like the Garden of Eden, and everywhere we

> looked there was bountiful food. I thought of how God provides all we need if we just notice it and share.



Humility is important. Everyone has value and brings a gift to the project. Doing the work is more important than doing the work perfectly. I can't wait to go back. And I need to learn Spanish!

ricks to Bread is an excellent organization in Costa Rica. The women seeking support have many avenues to get the application to them. Josefina and Amy Lori (representing Bricks to Bread) are boots on the ground, and they are responsible for vetting possible candidates. They are smart, efficient women who know what they're looking for.

I was amazed by the topography in Costa Rica, and all the volcanoes that are not active, but visible. The site where we were working was surrounded by thriving vegetation, and was breathtaking. The culture was as I anticipated — resorts on the ocean side, the Caribbean side, and wealth— and then alot of farming and poverty on the interior of the country.

I felt a lot of joy seeing the women as they do their daily work. They were proud of their work— "look at us and see what we're doing!" and showing their big smiles. I know that what we were doing every day in Costa Rica was helping them change their lives.

I told Nancy (Alvarez, founder of Bricks to Bread) and her husband, Chato this would not be the last time they see me in Costa Rica. I definitely want to go back. I could see some of the tools they had were wearing out, and I have purchased some to give to Nancy for the next oven build.

It's great to be back in the USA. Although I like being bussed around, it's always good to be back in my own bed!



Reflection from Louis Robards

ricks to Bread is a non-profit mission program in which volunteers help build outdoor brick ovens to create a sustainable income for women in rural Costa Rica. Last year the WCC Dough program awarded Bricks to Bread a grant to support their projects. Last summer they had a booth at the WCC Wednesday evening outdoor services showcasing their bread and pretzels. I told John Estrem of my interest in participating in one of their mission trips.

I had been to Costa Rica in the past and knew that its people are very welcoming, and the country is beautiful. This trip offered a unique opportunity to work directly with one family building an outdoor oven. By working and interacting daily with our host family, we were able to get to know them very well and experience their culture on a more personal level.

There is so much to learn from the Costa Rican people and their culture. They enjoy simplicity of lifestyle and freedom from distraction which we seem to often neglect in our culture. We left our comfort zone, but we experienced a deeper, more meaningful comfort zone. Perhaps this was God speaking to us through our host family.

Traveling to a different culture allows us to see the world from a new and enriching perspective, if we are open to it. If we suspend our own expectations and biases and enter fully into a different culture, we can receive much more than we give.

It was difficult to re-enter everyday life in Minnesota, even though we were gone for only ten days. The normal daily patterns soon return, but we can still recall the good life — the "Pura Vida" — the pure life of the Costa Rican people and culture.

ricks to Bread provides opportunities for women, many are single, heads of households, to own their own small business and achieve financial independence. Bricks to Bread empowers women to become leaders in their community. I was impressed that they provide long-term support after the oven is built and functional so that women will have a network of women supporting women.



What I learned about Cost Rican culture that I didn't know before the trip was Pura Vida. Pure life. Simplicity, blending into the environment. Excellent cooks and bakers. While serving in Costa Rica, I felt God's presence every morning at 5:30 a.m., sitting outside for my God-time with the roosters, dogs, and birds. Deep breathing in God in the lush greenery and colorful flowers, surrounded by feelings of peace, purpose and belonging.

As I prepared for this trip, I wanted to leave any preconceived ideas or expectations at home and look at everything without my American eyes, to be open to being in the present. When out of your comfort zone, you can be liberated from things you think you have to have. With liberation comes joy and hope and engagement.

Since returning home, there hasn't been a day when I haven't thought of the Loria women in Costa Rica and how our team worked together and with the family to build with them, not for them. It all comes down to love — loving your neighbor. I left a part of my heart in Costa Rica.

Sustainability

We are thrilled to announce that the City of Wayzata recently named Wayzata Community Church the first recipient of the city's new Wayzata Sustainability Champion Award.

"The City feels this is an important award because businesses and organizations have the potential to make significant positive impacts in sustainability," Wayzata Parks Planner Nick Kieser said. "We want to show how organizations are making progress so other groups can learn from them."

John Estrem has been WCC's Director of Building & Grounds for 41 years, and throughout his years in this role, sustainability has grown to become a front-of-mind consideration. "The church has a commitment to being a leader in taking care of the Earth," John said.

John has led sustainability initiatives for more than 20 years. Other key leaders in this work include WCC members Laura Babcock, Chad Gehrman, Jason Parks, Leigh Kallestad, Brian Trunk, and Don Miller all past or present members of the Building & Grounds Board.

SUSTAINABILITY PRACTICES

In 2003, Wayzata became the first city in Hennepin County to begin offering curbside organics recycling. As a neighborhood leader who championed that effort, John recalls wanting to bring that same mindset to WCC. "That's what really engaged me in wanting to implement an organics programs at WCC — so we started having a dumpster for organics as soon as it became available for a commercial account," he said.

John also saw an opportunity to bring sustainability practices to Wednesday community meals, which serve an average of 180 guests every week. The church decided to no longer use or offer disposable items, and instead began using reusable plates and silverware. WCC also started to prioritize placing waste into the organics bins, and have also eliminated individual servings of butter in plastic containers. The changes also led to the development of the "Kitchen Krew," a group of dedicated members who wash dishes after every meal.

WCC also began sorting through waste after each community meal to gather information on what was working and what could be done better. The efforts became such a priority that the weekly events were named "Zero Waste Community Meals."

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SUSTAINABILITY (CONTINUED)

John shared that one of the biggest surprises came when WCC used waste sort and purchasing information to learn that more than 1,700 pounds of paper towels had been going from the church to landfill each year. "That kind of blew our minds!" he said. That allowed church leaders to put organics labels, which were provided by Hennepin County at no cost, on all restroom containers and pair them with trash containers.

Among the most important improvement in sustainability made was switching to LED for all exterior lighting and most interior lighting. Boilers are tuned every year, HVAC filters are replaced on a regular schedule, and almost all fans and pumps have been equipped with variable frequency drives. Additionally, staff is encouraged to turn off office equipment when it's not in use, and motion sensor lights have been installed in offices and common work areas.

SOLAR INSTALLATION

WCC is getting closer to realizing a goal that John has had for more than a decade: solar installations in the church. "It was always such an expensive project," he said. "It almost seemed unreachable."

But, thanks to grants that are now available through Xcel Energy and the US Department of Energy for non-profit organizations, the reality of a solar installation on the roof has suddenly become a very affordable and compelling opportunity. "The availability of these grants was a complete game changer," said John. "It's like a dream come true for me."

And thanks to a years-long series of studies conducted by the Buildings & Grounds Board, WCC is well positioned to act quickly to pursue these grants with a solar provider already selected. We expect that the installation of the project could begin in August and be fully functional by later this fall. Our project of around 60 solar panels will provide about 10% of our electric energy needs and will pay for itself in less than 5 years, with an estimated total life of up to 25 years. And of course, much consideration of the placement of the panels has been given to allow for good functionality but also for a minimal impact on aesthetics for our beautiful building.

We are grateful for John, for his longtime vision of sustainability and care for the Earth, his team leadership through the years, and his dedication to seeing that dreams come true. Congratulations on this well-deserved Sustainability award!
